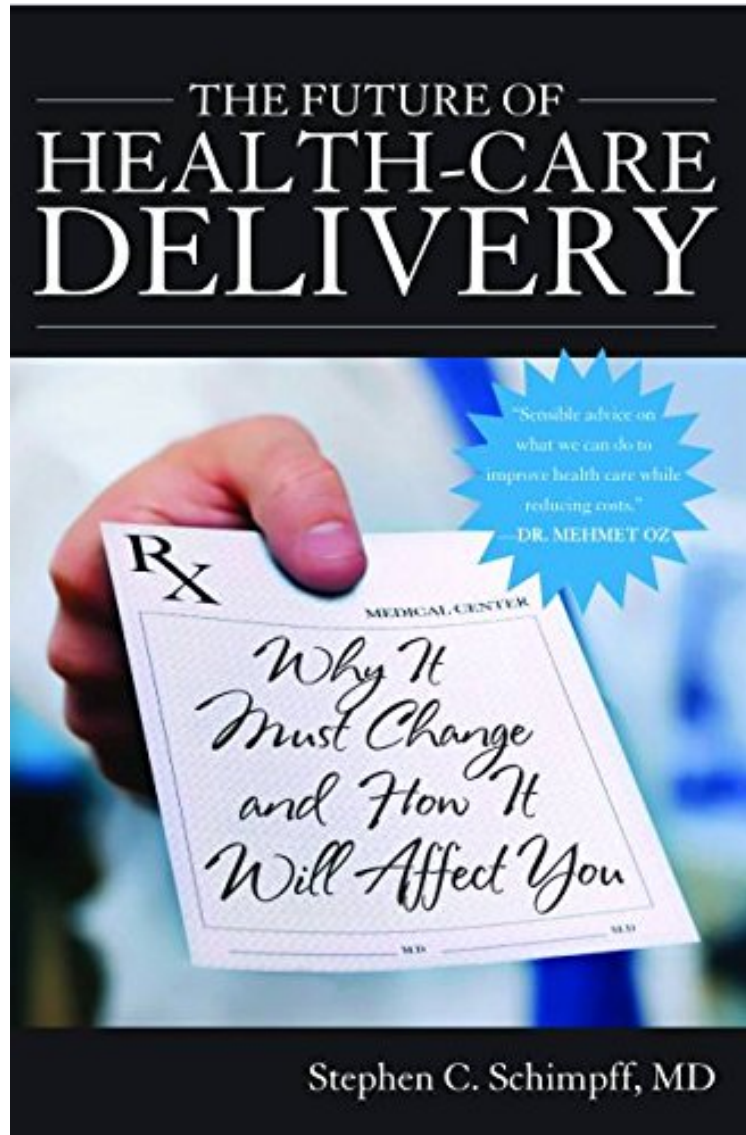

Schimpff proposes that we all pay high deductibles for our health care insurance, so that we appreciate what our Health Care insurance costs and therefore don't misuse it. He fails to recognize that (1) Millennials - AKA those who won't ever get sick - immortals - won't pay high premiums with high deductibles because they "don't need it." (2) Poor people simply won't pay high premiums for high deductible policies because they simply can't afford it, or would prefer to feed their families instead. (Is that so hard to predict?)
